## MESSAGE FROM OUR CITY COUNCIL

### A Local Focus Plus Regional Coordination

It's a real privilege to have been elected to serve as Mayor of this wonderful City. Your City Council is at your service, focused on ways to improve our lifestyle so we can enjoy being together in this place, our home town.



My colleagues and I enjoy visiting our clubs and service organizations. We feel welcome whenever we visit and give updates at neighborhood HOA clubhouses, our Senior Centers and classroom visits to schools. Those positive events are what give elected leaders the energy and desire to work even harder and dedicate more time. The conversations allow elected leaders to keep a finger on the pulse of the residents and know first-hand where to focus efforts and make improvements.

For some of us on Menifee's City Council, there is an additional commitment as part of our role. Our City is represented on numerous "regional" Boards and Committees by Council members who are willing to take on the added responsibility. Here are a just a few examples that come to mind.

- Western Riverside Council of Governments (Karwin) oversees funds collected by developers who are dispersed back to cities that have shovel-ready infrastructure projects.
- Western Riverside Regional Conservation Authority (Sobek), and Riverside County Habitat Agency (Sobek) make decisions about environmental protection for native species.
- Riverside Transit Agency (Deines) provides bus route services in the County.
- Animal Friends of the Valley Board (Deines) offers animal licensing and enforcement services to the City as part of a joint powers authority.
- Riverside County Transportation Commission (Zimmerman) reviews and approves funding for regional highway and rail corridors, toll lanes, and freeway interchanges to improve vehicle mobility across the western and desert cities.
- Chamber of Commerce Board (Zimmerman) helps attract new retailers, entertainment, restaurants, and all types of businesses that provide job opportunities.
- Council members also volunteer to serve on numerous sub committees that focus on finance, education and healthcare. These ad-hoc committees report back to the full council with recommendations.

While it comes naturally to want to circulate our wealth within our city, there can also be real value in considering things regionally and taking a cooperative approach with surrounding cities to improve traffic flow and realize new opportunities such as tourism. I admire my colleagues for their willingness to take on the extra responsibility, and I'm confident that we have the right people serving those regional posts and speaking on our behalf.

My monthly history tidbit:

Menifee has something very special. It is very old, and it is alive. How old? What is it?

On Scott Road, about a mile west of the I-215 freeway, is the Wickerd Farm where the family sells pumpkins and Christmas trees during the holidays. If you've been there you, may have felt comforted under the shade of one of the massive oak trees there. These are Coastal Live Oak trees (*Quercus agrifolia*), and some there are over 400 years old. One of them is special -- the "Grandmother Oak" as locals have named it -- and it is estimated to be as much as 700 years old. For a frame of reference, the Spanish missions were being built about 225 years ago. It is a feeling of awe to stand under the encompassing canopy of a tree that stood in the same place hundreds of years before the first Europeans explored this continent. The majestic trees still stand strong, and they're right here in Menifee.

### Update on the Bradley Bridge

Greetings, Sun City. After all of the rain, I wanted to give you another update on the Bradley Bridge project. We have designed a new bridge that will raise Bradley Road across Salt Creek so that it will not flood out during rainstorms. Having this road clear will give better access to emergency vehicles as well as allow residents to get in and out of Sun City safely.

Since we received partial funding from the Federal government, we were required to have the project signed off for compliance with the terms of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). This approval was issued during the last week of March.

The next step is to secure a temporary easement from surrounding properties to allow access to construction vehicles. Since the new bridge will be using some additional environmentally protected land, we have to transfer that protection to another location so we maintain the same amount of protected land in the city. Finally, we need the funding signed off by the California Transportation Commission. This is on the agenda for the CTC meeting in June.

We are optimistic that all of these steps will be completed by the end of June, allowing us to send the project out to bid for contractors. Weather permitting, we hope to start moving dirt before the end of 2024.

The highly anticipated project is estimated to take 18 months. Unfortunately, for part of that time, Bradley will be closed in both directions. We will provide advance notice of this closure so you can plan accordingly.

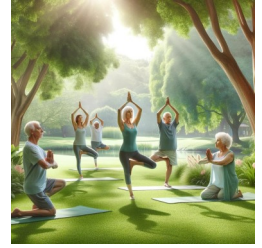
